#### REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Daniel 12:1-3

Hebrews 10:11-14,18

Mark 13: 24-32

As our liturgical year comes to an end Sunday, November 21st on the Feast of Christ the King, the Church puts before us these last weeks readings about the end times. Facing the end of our liturgical year, we see in nature in the Western Hemisphere the end of fall and dying of all creation. Winter is around the corner. The grass turns brown and goes dormant, leaves fall from the trees, we come face to face with death in the natural world and maybe a sense of our own death. The Book of Daniel and Mark's Gospel speak about the end of the world in symbolic language. Both readings might cause the reader to be afraid of this coming destruction. But the prophet Daniel and Jesus want us to be people who hope and long for the coming of God's kingdom. It should not be a time of horror and fear, but one of alertness. patience, and readiness for God's plan.

The first reading from the Book of the Prophet Daniel is definitely a piece of apocalyptic literature. Apocalyptic literature is made up of mysterious language, numerology, visions, dreams, and bizarre revelations. This type of literature is often misinterpreted and is used to instill fear. Its original purpose was to bring hope and consolation in the midst of tribulations and persecution. At the time this book was written, the Jewish people were under the control of King Antiochus Epiphanes IV, a Greek king in the dynasty of Seleucids. King Antiochus wanted to establish the Greek way of life in every aspect of his subject's life....culture, politics, and religion. Therefore, he was out to destroy Judaism. In today's reading, the author wants to bring hope to those suffering from the king's rule and his evil ways. God's reign would come, and those who are faithful will be rewarded. Obedience and fidelity to God's plan was the only way to overcome the evil of Antiochus.

In the Gospel, we hear from Mark, Chapter 13, often called the "little" or the "Marcan apocalypse". While some have shied away from the importance of Chapter 13, this chapter sums up Jesus' position: preparedness and watchfulness for his second coming and fidelity in the midst of persecution and trials. By his power to forgive sins and his suffering and death, Jesus had defeated evil and death. Jesus was encouraging all to continue to fight and to hold out hope until the end. By use of the symbol of the fig, Jesus was instilling in his followers the need to be prepared and read the signs. The fig tree would lose its leaves and go dormant for winter. In the spring it would develop green shoots and thereby forecast the coming of summer and the harvest of sweet delicious fruit. In the same way, Jesus followers should read the signs and know that sufferings, persecution, and trials will

be the indication that the end is around the corner when God's kingdom will be fully established.

So what does all this talk of the "end times" found in today's reading have to do with my present life. While we don't know when the end of the world will come, for most of us our death will be the end of the times we must deal with. Our death could take place at any moment. For most of us, myself included, we think our death will be a long time down the road, not something that will happen soon. Because of our false sense of when it will happen, we lack preparedness and alertness. We say "some day" I will do this or that to improve my life and be ready to meet my maker. Now, this present moment, is the time to take action and ready ourselves for his second coming. Today, this very moment, is the time to see his hand in my life and welcome him into the world.
