REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Ezekiel 2: 2-5
2 Corinthians 12: 7-10
Mark 6: 1-6

My wife and I have been watching the series Star Trek: Deep Space Nine which is the fourth series in the *Star Trek* franchise. In this series, a group of people called the Bajorans are led to “follow the prophets”. The “prophets” are a mysterious spiritual entity that helps direct people’s lives in all facets. While on Deep Space Nine the people wanted to know what “the prophets” said and to follow their guidance, in the real world we often fail to recognize a true prophet and don’t heed their message. In today’s Scripture readings, the prophet Ezekiel, the prophetic- speaking Paul, and Jesus, the greatest prophet, were not well accepted. Yet all three fervently and faithfully proclaimed their message and called people back to God. Like them we too must live our lives prophetically standing up for the Gospel knowing it will cost us.

In our first reading the prophet Ezekiel receives his call or mission to be prophet to the people of Israel. In receiving his commission, Ezekiel knows that his vocation will not be easy. For God is quite clear with Ezekiel. The people whom God is calling Ezekiel to prophesy to are rebels. God says they are hard of face and obstinate of heart. Yet God has chosen Ezekiel and wants him to proclaim this message whether easy or not. In the second reading, Paul is alluding to some special revelation he had received. Some who had received this special revelatory gift might become prideful and haughty. Paul instead was given a “thorn in the flesh” to keep him humble and centered on his mission. Although some have speculated this “thorn in the flesh” was some sort of disease or maybe persecution, no one really knows. What we do know is that Paul uses this malady to grow closer to Christ. Speaking prophetically, Paul says that God’s grace is sufficient for him, and God’s power is made perfect through this malady. After Ezekiel’s commission to be a prophet and Paul’s prophetic message, we hear from the greatest prophet Jesus in today’s Gospel. Jesus returns to his native place, his home, and while his message astounds his listeners, they cannot heed his message because surely a simple carpenter’s son can’t speak these prophetic words. All three, Ezekiel, Paul, and Jesus, speak God’s word and all three suffer rejection and a lack of faith.

By our baptism we are to participate in Christ’s mission as priest, prophet, and king. So, what does it mean to be a prophet? It means by our daily lives that we speak the truth of the Gospel. By our words and more importantly our actions we proclaim the Gospel message. And we do this to a world that like in Ezekiel and Jesus’ day failed to believe and often persecuted the prophets

themselves. So often we think living our Catholic Christian faith will be easy. Often we just want to fade into the fabric of the world without standing up for Gospel values. But to be a prophet means we do it with courage and boldness. We have to stand up and be counted for. Ridicule, persecution, and suffering will be a part of living our faith in this country. Yet, God gives his grace and love to handle whatever the world throws our way. His Church, empowered by the Holy Spirit, gives us guidance and support to live out our prophetic vocation. Let us lean on Jesus, the greatest prophet, to boldly and courageously proclaim the Gospel message.

But since marriage is serious work, there is a solemnity in the wedding ceremony.

Which means the wedding party must approach their liturgical duties seriously. The ceremony is a time for sober and solemn work. We are here to pray for the couple and to ask for God's Blessings to come upon them.

A sports analogy: there is much celebration when a team wins a championship. But the team doesn't start celebrating until after the game has been won.

As it is in athletics, so it is in a wedding. There is much celebration as a couple begins their life together. But not until after the serious work of prayer and petition of our Lord and Savior has been done.
