REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Acts of the Apostles 4: 32-35

1 John 5: 1-6 John 20: 19-31

Jesuit priest and theologian Fr. Bernard Lonergan wrote in his book, "Method of Theology" about the many types of conversions we experience in our lives. He said, "Conversion is existential, intensely personal, utterly intimate, but it is not so private as to be solitary. It can happen to many and they can form a community to sustain one another in their self-transformation and to help one another in working out the implications and fulfilling the promise of their new life. Finally, what can become communal can become historical. It can pass from generation to generation." I think this quote summarizes the entire Acts of the Apostles and specifically today's first reading. The early followers of Jesus, formed by the witness of the apostles through the power of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, shared their transformation in community. As these core beliefs and way of life were passed down through the years it became historical in what we call the Church. Conversion starts individually in our hearts, is shared with others in community, and finally becomes historical through the Church. And what does the Church pass on to all of us? We hear the answer in today's Gospel from John. Jesus is risen from the dead, and in his new risen life he passes onto the community, the Church, the power to forgive and to bring others to a life of belief.

Let's begin our reflection by looking at the short reading from the Acts of the Apostles. In this highly idealized and idyllic statement about what early church was like, the evangelist Luke shows us the power of community. Gathered around the Twelve, the early church shared all things in common including talents and goods. No one went away needy. The apostles formed the early church through liturgy, catechesis, and their way of life. If only the stewardship of time, talent, and treasure present in the early church could have the same impact for the church today. Transitioning to John's Gospel, we see the risen Lord appearing to first disciples. And what is Jesus' first words but "peace". Jesus dispels the fear present in the apostles after his death and brings a message of hope and peace. Then Jesus breathes on the Holy Spirit reminiscent of God breathing his divine life into Adam in the second creation story found in Genesis. These disciples are made a new creation and are commissioned to preach the message of forgiveness and peace. Through the community of the apostles and all believers, now the Church, the message of conversion and forgiveness are to be spread to the entire world.

As Lonergan said in his book, conversion is not so private as to be solitary. In other words, our salvation is worked out with others, not by ourselves. I recently saw in the

news that a 2020 Gallup Poll showed that less than half of people in America do not belong to a church, synagogue, or mosque. That survey says to me that Americans don't understand the power of community. In the Old Testament God did not save mere individuals but the whole nation of Israel. In the New Testament Jesus came to redeem the Church, the New Israel. God always works out our salvation as we live our lives with one another. We need one another, and most importantly we need forgiveness from one another. It seems to be that the power to forgive, which Jesus entrusted to his disciples in today's Gospel, was made real with Thomas and his being absent on Jesus' first appearance. The disciples could have ostracized Thomas for his unbelief. They could have kicked him out of their group, but they allowed him to continue to grow and be stretched in their group. They waited for the risen Jesus to change his heart. Let's work together side-by-side in the power of the Holy Spirit to bring out the Easter transformation.
