# **REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN:**

Exodus: 22: 20-26

1 Thessalonians: 1:5c-10

Matthew 22: 34-40

St. Paul in his First Letter to the Corinthians says, "So faith, hope, and love remain, these three: but the greatest of these is love". And in that same vein, Patricia Datchuck Sanchez in her commentaries about this Sunday's readings states, "Before cult, ritual, or creeds, the Lord has required that we love". Love is the foundation of our Christian life, love is our purpose, and love is our hope.

In the first reading from Exodus, we see how social justice and taking care of the marginalized has been a part of our religious heritage even before Jesus teachings. In today's periscope, God is telling his people that keeping his commandments requires concern for aliens or strangers, care of widows and orphans, and justice when making a loan. Because the Israelites where once strangers in the land of Egypt, God now required that they treat strangers and aliens with the same compassion. As God had done for them in Egypt, now they must also do. Secondly, widows and their children, labeled orphans even though their mother lived, were to be given special care and concern because they had no rights once the husband died. Finally, Israelites were not to extort interest from a fellow Israelite. That meant even giving a poor person back their cloak before nightfall.

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus is asked the one question every reputable rabbi was asked. What was the greatest commandment of the law? The answer that Jesus gave was not new in the sense that others had combined the two laws, love of God and love of neighbor. However, Jesus' answer was radical in that he made the two laws parallel and of equal importance. Love of God and love of neighbor were on the same plan. You might say you can't love God without loving your neighbor.

Jesus' radical thinking, which made these two laws of equal importance, has major implications for our Christian faith. If we truly want to be called Christian, then our lives must give evidence of loving our neighbor. We can't excuse ourselves from charity in the fact that we go to Church on Sundays and receive the sacraments. Authentic Gospel living means we live out in a concrete way love for all men and women. Following from the reading of Exodus and the Church's teaching throughout history, we must show concern especially for the poor and marginalized. Throughout

Church history, the Church has always espoused preferential treatment for the poor.

So, what will these readings demand from us? The corporal works of mercy are fleshed out in feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and burying the dead. Each day we are called to love all men and women in simple concrete ways. Maybe that call is accomplished for those who are closest to us, our families.... parents, kids, our brothers and sisters. Or maybe on a more national level, we fight for immigrants, the homeless, and the abused. Whatever we do, our faith and our religious beliefs must be lived out each day in how we love God and one another.

With uncertainty caused by the pandemic it was decided to NOT charter busses for the 25+ hour trip because confining a large group of people in a bus is not advisable at this time. The alternative to riding the bus is to fly to D.C. or drive yourself there! Airline tickets are currently priced at an affordable rate, but that will change quickly as the January event date draws closer. The Diocese WILL NOT purchase airline tickets, that is up to each individual or group to do on their own. The Diocese WILL provide hotel accommodations and transportation in D.C.! Expected cost per person for hotel and transportation in D.C. is \$200. The DEADLINE to register is NOVEMBER 20th, 2020 with two ways to register. Online registration is available, or you can mail in your registration. Full payment of \$200 is due with your registration. Make checks payable to Salina Diocese Respect Life Office and mailed to PO Box 980, Salina, KS 67402, attention: March for Life. Cost of travel must be paid by the individual. Registration forms, Medical/Waiver forms, are available on the diocesan Website. ALL plans are subject to change as the ongoing pandemic makes it difficult to be assured of anything. When purchasing airline tickets be sure to ask about refundability or transferring the use of your ticket to a later date in the event we don't go
